DECEMBER MEETING

The November meeting took up the Island usage motions made at the last meeting with vigor. The motion that was finally passed, after an hour and a half of careful debate, stated that, except for applicants that were issued Guest Cards for last year, all other applicants on the waiting list must be on the waiting list for 3 years to be eligible for a Guest Card. In addition, the motion to "freeze" the waiting list was defeated but a significant new motion was made that would limit the time period that people could apply to join the club to only the first quarter of the year.

The December Annual Meeting will be held on the home of Peggy Thomson at 8:00 p.m. on December 8. This is the meeting when the new budget is voted on and new officers elected. All members are encouraged

8:04 p.m. The minutes of the last meeting were approved.

Budget Report: Tryon Wells reported for Johnna Robinson that the budget was in order and the 2000 budget will be prepared for presentation at the next meeting.

Islander Report: David reported that he had problems with desk-top publishing software but was able to work around them to get last month's *Islander* out.

Canoe Report: David Winer reported that two more canoes have been purchased from the Pocomoke River Canoe Company in Snow Hill, Maryland. This livery service sells their entire fleet of canoes each year. The added boats will replace some of our battered aluminum Grummans. We now have a total of five of these Old Town *Discoverer 174* canoes, a type that has been particularly well received by the members. Being longer, wider, and more flat-bottomed than our older canoes, members have noted their increased stability in the water. Also purchased from the livery were ten life preservers and ten fiberglass/aluminum paddles. Total cost of canoes, life preservers, and paddles was about \$1,000.

Captain's Report: John Matthews reported that the electric line break which disabled the towpath lights was near the house, and is now fixed. A winter warmroom for substitute caretakers will be provided in the Clubhouse just outside the women's toilet and locker rooms; the large window in that room will be replaced with an insulated window

Caretaker's Report: Doc laid out printed materials provided by the Park Police about the fish ladder construction at the Little Falls Dam. He announced that members John and Martha Foley are willing to give canoe instruction in the late spring. A malfunctioning, overflowing washing machine is causing floor rot below it. Doc suggested that we put in a new floor and washing machine at the same time. Phyllis suggested that we check newspaper ads when it comes time to replace the ping-pong table. An additional callbell for the ferry has been strung in the tree next to the Clubhouse.

Report on the status of the Island water system: The water delivery system failed and the Island was without water for three days. The problem was fixed by replacing the pressure valve which had been disabled by floods and debris buildup. The water, however, smells

foul. The caretaker and his family have been using bottled water. Others are advised to bring their own drinking water to the Island. Experts have been called to test the water. The bacterial test is negative. Test results for other possible contaminants are due in several weeks. The captain advises that the suggestions of the experts be followed.

Old Business:

Motions initiated last month and published in the Islander were presented for voting. Here are the results:

Several motions to curb guest cards as printed in last month's minutes were defeated before Brad Coolidge's motion was passed in amended form as follows:


Effective January 1, 2000, issuance of guest cards shall be limited to those who have been on the waiting list for three years. Those who have been on the waiting list for less than three years but who have held a guest card in 1999 may renew.

The following modification to 6. <u>Guest Cards</u> now reads as follows (new wording in italics):


"Upon the request of an applicant for membership who is in good standing, and if the applicant has been on the waiting list for a minimum of 3 years, the Membership Secretary may issue to such applicant a guest card valid for the year in which issued."














Morris Cobern, Publishing Ally


hen David and I came aboard as editors of the *Sycamore Islander* early last fall, we planned to make one change to the newsletter: we wanted to include good quality black & white photographs in the text. So early one morning, armed with a list of 4 commercial printer-candidates (including the company we inherited from John Thomson), we made the rounds. As it turned out, Morris Cobern of Allied Printing in Bethesda was the only printer we interviewed who thought that he could help us accomplish our goal.

Morris looked at the series of glossy, highresolution photographs that David had printed out with an ink-jet printer--pictures of the Island reflected in still water--and told us to take them home, reduce the resolution, and print them out again, with a laser printer. The results, which appeared in our first issue of the Islander, disappointed all three of us. When the next issue was in order and the photos ready, Morris gave us another assignment: "Go back," he instructed David, "and correct the contrast, which is too high; reduce the darkest darks and the lightest lights." Then he sent us home with the special paper required for printing the photos, and assured David that the retouching software he needed for the job "... isn't hard to use, once vou know how!"

Since then each successive issue of the *Sycamore Islander* has benefited from Morris's suggestions. It was he who suggested we go to 2 columns instead of one--the newsletter is easier to read. He and his assistants have also helped David choose new software, so we no longer lay out the newsletter on a word processor, but use Microsoft Publisher. When David has had problems with computer or software, he has been able to work directly with an expert in the Allied shop, Adri DeGroot, to solve those problems.

Morris does more than just print the *Islander* for us; he actually reads it. He reads it for content and, in fact, goes over everything like an editor.

His comments caused David to rewrite a piece, for example. In the nitty-gritty department, it was Morris who recently picked up on the fact that we had inadvertently left out the permit number in the postage imprint on the newsletter, so he inserted it by hand for us--on all 400 copiesbefore it got to the Post Office. Now, since he handles the mailing, he has even brought a couple of incorrect local zip codes to our attention.




The proprietor relaxes with "Onyx" before tackling the next issue of the *Sycamore Islander*.

Notes from the Island

I hope that those of you who participated in the Workfest are proud of yourselves... because certainly I am. There were 75 of you signed in, and Phyl and I both reflected afterwards that it seemed that there were just as many folks attending who have guest cards as there were Members. There were also two volunteer families present who have applications pending but who are not even on the waiting list yet. However, a notable thought is that I do not think there were any waiting list people here except those who have guest cards. And this is a shame, because again this year there seemed to be more fun than work, despite the fact that so much got done.

The Clubhouse got a good cleaning, which is good because it was not touched during the spring Workfest. Ann Waidmann and Sherry Pettie were the team leaders. David Winer and his team cleaned the Club canoes and painted the outside hulls of the plastic canoes with an acrylic coating. Gerry Barton and his helpers constructed two new picnic tables. Tryon Wells and his group buried the new electric cable on the towpath and installed wiring conduit where it comes out of the ground. Roger Herst brought his electric powered blower and took care of the leaves near the house. Many people brought rakes and during the day various teams seemed to coalesce here then there until the Island was done. Mark Brenneman and Joe Cecil were not only the first two to arrive (only ten people showed up before 10 AM), but together took responsibility for getting the swimming float untethered and in to shore where it could be pulled up with the help of Jim Drew, Chris White, Garret and Dan Rasmussen, et.al. Mark was also instrumental in repairing the hole that has appeared near the steps on the towpath landing.

Several days before John Matthews and son John had installed the new insulated window in the small room off the deck, which is being insulated to provide a warm library and hangout for

the winter substitute caretakers. Bill Banta and his team ripped the lockers out of that room and the unsightly cabinet off the wall. Holdridge and Tove Elfstrom repaired the Caretaker's screen door, and Tove stayed late to replace and redo some of the planking that leads to the steps to the deck. Trip Reid and his team planted the five large new trees, and you are all challenged to find where they are. Trip also had several teams out wrapping certain Island trees with wire to protect them from beaver depredation. John Membrino was given a special secret assignment and suffered a nail puncture in his foot for the cause. And of course, George and Marcia Loeb performed their logistical miracle again, and aided by several pots of luck, sat evervone down for that sort of communal dinner one only sees in the movies these days.

Limited space in the dispatches means not everyone will get mentioned, as they should. And yet, it seemed like one of those rare events where participation is its own reward. Think about it... many people who did not necessarily know one another came together in various small teams during the day to undertake a series of various tasks that singly were not very glamorous but together were crucial to making the Island ship-shape for the winter. Most of these teams were collaborative efforts where no one was the actual boss but where the better idea imposed its own authority to get the job done. Yet I dare say that when most people left the Island that day they left with that warm glow that comes only from a feeling of accomplishment... and where can you get that and what price can you put on it?
