Join us for the 9th Annual Sycamore Island Winter Bird Walk

Please join us for the Club's Ninth Annual Sycamore Island Winter Bird Walk scheduled for **Saturday**, **February 18**, **2017**. Our outing will begin at 8:00 AM with bagels and coffee at the clubhouse. Our plan is to walk the Island and the towpath in the vicinity of the Island from 8:30 AM to 10:00 a.m. looking for visiting winter waterfowl and other resident and migratory songbirds. Following the walk, we will compare notes on the day's sightings over coffee around the wood stove at the clubhouse. Both beginners and experienced birders are encouraged to join us.

Although snow has presented challenges in recent years, participants have typically been rewarded with good looks at numerous resident and migratory birds, including: Wood Duck, Ring-neck Duck, Bufflehead, Hooded Merganser, Common Merganser, Horned and Pied-billed Grebes, Red Shouldered and Red Tailed Hawks, Blue Birds, and our local woodpeckers. We will also be on the lookout for the elusive Common Ravens that have adopted the area as their new home. Our resident Bald Eagles usually start to nest this time of year just down river in a Sycamore tree that is also easily seen from the Island. CARETAKER'S LOG

Wednesday -- January 4, 2017

Water Level at Little Falls: 3.7 Water Temperature: 43

The river is still going up but it isn't as muddy as it was yesterday right after the rain. It's funny, the muddy water seemed to come only from the Maryland shore, just one hundred feet off of Sycamore Island the river was totally clear, making for a two-toned river.

Mary and I watched the eagles do their courtship acrobatics while we were standing in the upper parking lot yesterday. I guess it's time to start keeping an eye on the nest.

I was away on leave for a week at Christmas and as far as I know there was no one serving as caretaker while I was gone. I hope everything worked out OK and that no one was cursing my name because I wasn't here. There doesn't seem to be a good way to let the members know when I'm on leave. I really didn't want to announce it here on the world wide web.

Tuesday -- January 10, 2017

Water Level at Little Falls: 3.4 Water Temperature: 32

There has been a little bit of ice on the river yesterday and also today, but thankfully it isn't very thick.

I ventured out yesterday morning and braved the stinging wind to check for animal tracks in the new snow. I found only the tiny tracks of a white-footed mouse and the Woodstock-like birdie tracks around the bird feeders. I guess the cold kept the night prowlers safely snuggled in their burrows. Even the perpetually busy beaver decided that it was too cold to go out.

Likewise, I did most of my bird watching from my living room, which is not as bad as it may sound. The feeders were busy with the usual suspects but we also had a brown creeper at the feeder and I also saw a red-necked grebe, a hooded merganser and the common merganser.

The steady wind has helped me to find the drafty spots in my quarters and I deployed the foam insulation and caulk. I also performed the annual duty of replacing the ultra-violet lamp in the water filtration system. It's a bit of a tricky job.

Monday -- January 16, 2017

Water Level at Little Falls: 3.68 Water Temperature: 32

Today is the day that we honor that brave American, Martin Luther King Jr. May he rest in peace.

The schools, banks and post offices are closed but Sycamore Island is open and ready for visitors. Sadly, no one has been down all day. Maybe they all left town for the long holiday.

I breathed new life into the old dishwasher here in my quarters. It wasn't cleaning the dishes very well and I thought that, since it's about twenty years old, maybe it was time for a new one. I decided to take a closer look and ended up taking apart the insides and cleaning off all of the built up grease and dirt that was clogging some of the parts. I also ran the dishwasher with some vinegar and a degreaser to clean it out and I'm going to replace the screen for the water filter. The machine works much better now and the Club's budget didn't have to take an unexpected hit for a new dishwasher.

Wednesday -- January 25, 2017

Water Level at Little Falls: 6.53 Water Temperature: 43

It's been a long time since I had to say this but the FERRY IS CLOSED.

The river is above five feet and that means that we have to close the ferry. the good news is that we haven't had to shut her down for about seven months. It was back in May and then very briefly in June the last time that the river was this high.

The rising river should crest overnight tonight, but the ferry may not be running again for a while, maybe not until Sunday or Monday. We'll have to wait and see.

I did all of the flood preparation last night. I secured the ferry and raised up all of the ropes and cables. It's been a while but I still remembered how to get



ready for a flood. It was nice that all of the docks are already on shore so I didn't have to fuss with them.

There is a new and very important film about our beloved Potomac and it features the work of our friends at Potomac Riverkeeper. It aired on MPT

Friday -- January 27, 2017

Water Level at Little Falls: 5.79 Water Temperature: 45

The river crested last night. The gauge at Little Falls reached 6.94 feet. Translation: the water would have been over your knees if you were standing at the ferry landing on the Island.

The river level is falling now but the ferry will not be running again until Sunday. I already emailed tomorrow's relief caretaker about the saturation situation.

I just learned that this has been D.C.'s longest run of days above freezing in the month of January, ever. Maybe not ever, but at least since they started to keep records, back in the 1870's.

I counted 16 mourning doves below the bird feeders today.



Monday -- January 30, 2017

Water Level at Little Falls: 4.7 Water Temperature: 42

The ferry is open again. It took a while for the river to go back down but we are finally open again, too bad that the weekend is over.

We had a little bit of snow last night so I had to go out early this morning to look for animal tracks again. This time I did see some beaver tracks, or trails rather. With the way they drag their tail, they leave a big swath through the shallow snow. Interestingly, there were two obvious trails that originated from



opposite sides of the Island yet both trails led to the same spice bush near the deck. Weird. The snow was pretty wet and we found the muddy imprint of the beaver's tail, scales and all, preserved in the snow.

I can't tell if the eagles have started to sit on any eggs yet but I have been seeing the eagles more frequently lately.

The Sycamore Store

62nd RUNNING OF CCA POTOMAC DOWNRIVER RACE



SATURDAY, MAY 13, 2017

What race do you know of that has lasted consecutively for 62 years? The 62nd running of the CCA Potomac Downriver Race hosted by Sycamore Island and co-sponsored by Potomac Whitewater Racing Center will be Saturday, May 13th. COME AND BE A PART OF ONE OF THE GREATEST AND LONGEST RUNNING WHITEWATER RACES IN THE NATION! JOIN THE FUN!

Online registration is now easy. Go to http://www.canoecruisers.org/ and log in as a member or a guest. Find Downriver Race with the Race tab on the left. Advance registration is \$20, day of race the entrance fee will increase to \$25. Note also that \$5 per paddler must be included in the fee for insurance unless the paddler is a member of ACA (American Canoe Association). Tandem teams pay as two individuals. Liability forms must be signed on race day.

The Maryland Canoe & Kayak Racing Series event begins at Rocky Island on the Potomac River just above Wet Bottom Rapid and continues for 7.5 miles to Sycamore Island. The race also will be a USA Wildwater Ranking Race. At the end of the race, a free T-shirt and a free lunch will be given to all workers and racers, and there will be a ceremony with awards and prizes for the winners. (If you do not attend the ceremony, do not expect to receive the above! No awards will be mailed!)

Sign-in begins at 9 a.m. to 10:30 a.m. at Great Falls Tavern/C&O National Park in Potomac, Maryland, followed by a **mandatory meeting** for all racers. If the river is over 5 feet, the race will start at the Old Anglers Inn put-in. And if the river is over 6 feet, the race will be postponed. Notice regarding any changes will be posted in the CCA, PWRC, and Monocacy Canoe Club websites.

This is a race for any whitewater paddler from the pros to parent/child tandem teams, but this is **NOT A NOVICE RACE**. All participants should have experience in and be comfortable with up to **Class III rapids**. Participants may enter with any type of a boat provided it is properly outfitted with **adequate floatation** (air bags) and all occupants of the boat are wearing a **helmet and a PFD** (life jacket).

If you plan to paddle the race, **PLEASE PRE-REGISTER** to help with registration and planning. Please do not bring two cars to the race -- parking will be difficult and a **shuttle** will be provided.

VOLUNTEER helpers are needed for **safety boats** and for helping at the registration at Great Falls and at the finish at Sycamore Island. Volunteers will receive the gratitude of the racers, a sense of participating in an important annual river event, a race T-shirt, and lunch.

Minutes for January 11, 2017 Meeting of the Sycamore Island Club

The first meeting of the New Year was held at the home of John and Susanna

Membrino and called to order by our new president Richard Bertaut.

Attendees: Rodolfo Castro, Sherry Fizdale, David Winer, Meredith Griggs, Gerald Stanley Barton, John Membrino, Susanna Membrino, Tryon Wells, John Noble, Steve Newman, Jane Winer, Maureen McElroy, Paul McElroy, Anne Marie Cunningham, Jody Benjamin, Jim Drew, Ned Goddard, Richard Bertaut, Kathy Carroll, Molly Newberry, Jeff Komarow, Nancy Shupe, and Marianne Ross.

Treasurer: Ned Goddard reported that he is hard at work completing the 2016 Federal and State tax filings for the Club to meet Federal and State deadlines. He also reported good news for the Club's renewals of insurance premiums, "across the board" reductions on policy premiums on various coverages for the Club in Flood, Liability and Property, as FEMA has reclassified our Policy with more than 50% savings! Ned is reviewing supplemental coverages that the Broker is proposing because of these savings; for example, the possibility of recovering member fee income in case of loss of usage to Club facilities due to property or flood damage. He thanked Supervisor of Finance Lisa Kliefoth for her years of dedicated service as Supervisor of Finance and looks forward to working with Anne Marie Cunningham in that position. He then welcomed Sherry Fizdale as incoming Financial Secretary.

Financial Secretary: Sherry Fizdale expressed satisfaction upon hearing the Treasurer's report about reductions of costs to the Island. She expressed hope of reducing Club expenses further with Stan Fowler as our new Captain. Stan is experienced in the art of "getting things done," as his success in restoring the Spanish Ballroom and the Cuddle-Up at Glen Echo Park while Park Ranger at Glen Echo Park attest. Deputy Captain Rodolfo Castro looks forward to working with Stan.

Membership Secretary: The name of member Anne Waidmann was proposed to fill the position and the motion passed unanimously.

Sycamore Islander Editor: The position has been filled by Rebecca Carroll as a Service Member. President Richard Bertaut crafted a contract for her, which was presented and approved. Former Island president Jeff Komarow commended Ms. Carroll for getting out the current newsletter in timely fashion. The newsletter as a file required 18 pages to print, however, and the discussion of format sparked New Business.

New Business: Various attendees commented on their preferred method of contact, both for urgent club communications, and for longer term (archival) documentation of newsletters, meetings, and activities. Ned Goddard proposed the creation of an *Ad Hoc* committee to consider four different solutions for electronic communication among Club members. Use of a ListServ or Mail Chimp product are among the suggestions. Additional New Business included the suggestion to invite RG Steinman and John Parrish to conduct a Spring Wildflower for the Club in April.

Old Business: Lively discussion carried over from previous meetings in which Camping Rules was the issue. Some think individual rules are not specific enough and need to be modified. Others disagree, but as the discussion proceeded, other issues germane to camping were brought up, such as defining member and caretaker responsibilities, provisions crucial to camper safety (e.g., being on the Island after dark), Large Party Rules, operating the ferry and Saturday Caretaking. Clearly, the Standing Rules and Bylaws require further discussion, as members need to be fully informed of the responsibilities and procedures for camping safety as well as consideration for other members and the Caretaker.
