## <u>The Club Archives Story</u> <u>Origin, Carnegie Library Home and Temporary Move to Newseum</u> Archivist's Note by Karen B. Possner

Since 1885, various members have assumed responsibility for safekeeping papers considered important to the club's collective memory, i.e., our "precious documents." In practice, this meant that miscellaneous envelopes, folders, binders and cartons stuffed with paper often sat for years in someone's basement or attic and then when various torches were passed, the papers passed to the next volunteer. Or not. Nothing in the collection was organized, much less inventoried, and so the whole undertaking, while well intentioned, was decidedly haphazard. Realizing this could not go on indefinitely, the members formed an Ad Hoc Archival Committee to make a recommendation regarding permanent storage of our papers.

On September 13, 1989, this situation was (more or less) rectified when members who had gathered for the monthly meeting unanimously agreed to a motion to deposit our archives with the Historical Society of Washington, D.C., located in the Carnegie Library. Until recently, this meant that any interested member could contact the Society, request an appointment and spend a leisurely few hours in a pleasant reading room, cruising through various folders to see what we've preserved for posterity. But time marches on.

The Carnegie Library has two key distinctions: it was Washington's first public library and also D.C.'s first desegregated public building. Donated by Andrew Carnegie and dedicated in 1903, it was added to the U.S. National Register of Historic Places in 1969. The New York architectural firm of Ackerman & Ross is responsible for its outstanding Beaux-Arts design.

The age and grandeur of the building, coupled with its Mount Vernon Square location, have made redevelopers drool for years and this summer its future was finally decided. In an August 10th press release, the Library's Board of Trustees announced it has signed an agreement to share the Carnegie Library with Apple and Events DC (aka Washington Convention and Sports Authority). The first floor of the restored Carnegie Library will house a new Apple Global Flagship store and the Historical Society will relocate to space above the store. The exterior of the library will be restored, the interior spaces will be renovated and the redesigned building will

provide the Historical Society with a state-of-the-art research library, storage space, new galleries and technology to properly house the Society's collections.

In the meantime, the Historical Society will occupy space on the third floor of the Newseum located at 555 Pennsylvania Avenue, N.W. Sycamore Island Club members (and others) have been able to visit and peruse the Club archives as of September 19th. If all goes according to plan, the Historical Society and the Club Archives will return to the Carnegie Library on Mt. Vernon Square by December 2018.

## Tryon Wells and the Revamped Club Website

When I answered my telephone a few months ago, I rejoiced that it was not a telemarketer but, rather, club *grandee*, Tryon Wells. He said he required assistance "on an archiving project" & since I am the club archivist, how soon could I be at his house to lend a hand? Most of you know about the years of service Tryon has already rendered to our club (counted in decades) so, when he asks for help, I pretty much salute.

When I arrived 30 minutes later (changed out of a wet bathing suit & into club archiving attire) I was presented with a perfectly produced & designed spreadsheet that showed -- month-bymonth -- year-by-year -- from 1988 to 2013 – when, where & how our caretakers had summarized their lives & notable events on our island -- in the form of *Notes from the Island*, in the *Caretaker's Log* or, in some cases, both. Faced with 300 spreadsheet entries, I did not immediately grasp the task before us. Much less its purpose. I'll come to that later.

If I did not appreciate it before (I did), I was reminded again that one person has dedicated a not insignificant portion of his time to preserving & organizing our club's history. The next time you see him, you might consider saying "thanks." Our afternoon working together is the impetus for this note, the purpose of which is to remind us all that our website contains a vast array of (mostly) useful information that you might want to check out some day.

Go to sycamoreisland.org & you'll find a page that shows our logo -- a bright green sycamore leaf atop crossed canoe paddles -- surrounded by the words: Sycamore Island Canoe Club (NOT our name). The homepage is organized into 13 categories, each of which is a link:

The *Weather*, etc. category is a catch-all for 12 sub-categories, all relating to river levels, weather radar, etc. – pretty self-explanatory & essential for island, member & guest safety.

Clicking on the *Sycamore Islander Newsletter Articles* icon brings you to a list of seventy (yes, 70) articles written by members between November 1997 & March 2004 covering a wide range of subjects (see especially the June 2001 article on Fletcher's).

The section on *Club History* contains a short description of, yes, our club history but also includes fourteen links to our standing rules, by-laws, articles of incorporation, monthly meeting archives, maps & land patents, etc. Most importantly, the first link takes you to the Centennial Issue of the Islander (1885-1995) which includes *forty more links*, including articles on the legendary CIA canoe pool, the trolley line, our ferries & bridges, wildflowers, birds & fuzzier critters.

The *How to Host a Large Party* link is self-explanatory & contains two links to further relevant information.

If you click on the *Caretaker's Log* icon, indicated by a yellow face with flashing eyes & moving mouth, the page is headed by a photo of our own treasured Joe Hage & is (sometimes) a daily compilation of items that Joe believes warrant our attention. When you get to the bottom of the page, you'll see another link to "Caretaker's Log Archives" which runs from January 1997 to July 2016; as I write this, the latest entry is for August 2<sup>nd</sup>.

The *Calendar of Events & Large Parties* icon is also self-explanatory & allows you to search month-by-month for scheduled events on the island.

Click on the icon for *Official Club Information* (policeman's cap? suggest new icon?) and you're presented with a list of eight categories, which link to further information such as club officers, board of directors, the island code (pretty important, actually), as well as a place to search for anything not immediately evident. By the way, it also includes four recipes; I can only vouch for Jane Winer's baked grits (everything she bakes is excellent).

Anyone interested in pursuing membership will find that clicking on the *Membership Info* icon is the logical place to start. Hopeful applicants are presented with four links that lead to four more links on the application process, a statement of who we are & what we're about, on dues and fees, and how to find your way to the island.

Another self-explanatory category, *Contact the Club*, contains names & email addresses for all officers & supervisors, as well as the caretaker (these are the dedicated people who go out of their way to help you enjoy the island safely).

If you click on *Sycamore Island Picture Gallery*, you'll immediately see eight photos; click on them & you'll find many, many more. When I visit our archives at the D.C. Historical Society (now temporarily located at the Newseum), looking through old photos provides a rich history that's hard to put into words. You'll need an appointment, but all are welcome.

Click on *Notes from the Island* & you'll find a trove of Island history & trivia – the jottings & musings of caretakers from January 1989 to February 2013. Many entries are in essay form & some read like poetic musings while others are distillations of the caretaker's log. (more on this in a moment).

Have you heard of the Jefferson Islands Club? Started in 1931 by 3 U.S. senators, its purpose is to support/defend/advance government principles enunciated by Thomas Jefferson. It's located in Maryland, seventy miles southeast of D.C. on St. Catherine's Island & has duck blinds, a swimming pool, canoes & kayaks, as well as other amenities. I learned about it by clicking on *Links to Other Sites* & then other island clubs.

Our final category, *Relief Caretaker Schedule*, lists who has volunteered & dates for which volunteers are still needed. If you haven't called Madeleine Carter recently to volunteer (301-412-3304), shame on you. Meredith Griggs must have Madeleine's number on speed dial (or vice versa).

The purpose of Tryon's project was to enable a massive cleanup of the club's website, deleting a great deal of duplicate historical information. Remember when I wrote that *Notes from the Island* sometimes is a distillation of the *Caretaker's Log*? Well, now, in each & every case where *Notes* entries have duplicated *Log* entries, all that duplicate information has been (or is in the process of being) deleted from the *Notes*. Since the *Caretaker's Log* is the official record of what's going on, all that has been preserved.

How many members will notice these changes? And how many will appreciate that the club's website has been streamlined (relatively-speaking)? To all those who volunteer their time, muscles & mental effort to keep our club afloat – thanks. We really do appreciate it even if we don't say it often enough.

#### Monday -- August 28, 2017 Water Level at Little Falls: 2.9 Water Temperature: 84

We got everything set up and then we ate donuts and drank coffee while we waited for all of the competitors to show up.

There were so many racers that we ran out of boats and we had to have two separate heats of 15 boats each. After the ping pong ball pick-up we started the grill and the kids started the water gun battle. #### Sunday -- September 24, 2017

#### Water Level at Little Falls: 2.7 Water Temperature: 78

It's been super busy down here this week. The river and weather conditions are perfect, plus the kids in Montgomery County didn't have school on Thursday and the DC schools were closed on Friday. I keep a list of school closings in Montgomery County so I was prepared for the onslaught on Thursday but I was really surprised to arrive back on the Island on Friday and see the place swarming with kids before noon. Mary and I are really enjoying having all of these really cute kids here and they are all so helpful and well behaved, mostly. The best part is when we're all on the ferry going back to the mainland and one of the kids says that it was the best day of their life or that Sycamore Island is their favorite place in the whole world.

I don't have any wild animal stories to share. It seems that our humming birds have left for warmer climes or maybe they aren't using our feeder since there are literally thousands of jewel weed flowers for them to feed on. On the Island we have the yellow jewel weed almost exclusively, with maybe one or two of the orange, spotted jewel weed. Along the towpath it is the exact opposite with a profusion of the spotted jewel weed growing in the canal prism for as far as the eye can see and hardly any yellow ones. The spotted ones are very pretty but they do not grow as tall and they seem to prefer that wet soggy ground. The other name for the jewl weed is touch-me-not, and yesterday I had my first seed pod explode in my hand when I touched it. Flowers going to seed, it must be Autumn.

I'm hoping that this new warm spell will reinvigorate the fishing. I haven't had very much luck this summer but someone caught a 15-incher last week, so there is still hope for me to improve my season's catch.

# Minutes for the September 23, 2017 Meeting of the Sycamore Island Club

President Richard Bertaut called the meeting order. Attendees introduced themselves. Notes take at the August meeting were accepted without correction. There were no official minutes as there was no quorum.

#### Communications: None

**Treasurer's Report:** No report. Treasurer Ned Goddard is working in Florida on work related to hurricane Irma.

**Captain's Report:** While the Captain was not present, others talked of ongoing projects, such as replacing some of the wood on the island side of the ferry landing. The current low river water levels will permit an examination of the canal side landing as well. There has been talk of replacing some of the screens in the club house doors, but so far no plan to do so.

Dave Winer noted that there was a new tight rope and safety wire on the downside of the island. Children attending the Regatta enjoyed trying it out.

Gerry Barton suggested removing or moving the swing, noting that there had been two collisions of swingers with persons passing in the area. Others recommended better supervision of children by parents and better warning signs. Still others suggested that orange cones be put around the area during events such as the Regatta.

One member suggested that there should be a weight limit for users of the swing, but Dave Winer reassured the assembled about the strength of the swing's construction.

It was also noted that the horseshoe game area has sharp spikes that could do serious harm. It was suggested that we put old tennis balls on the spikes.

Others suggested that signage on both swing and horseshoe area might be useful.

**Membership Secretary's Report:** Anne Waidman said there was no change from last month in the number of members and wait list members.

There was a long discussion about changing the dates prospective members could submit applications and enter the bi-annual lottery and the date that the lottery would be held. There was general agreement that if these activities were scheduled for the Fall, prospective members would have time to visit the island during clement weather. That would give them the opportunity to attend meetings on the island and meet members who might later be willing recommend them for membership. VP John Noble will write a proposal and submit it for discussion at the next Club meeting.

Archives Secretary's Report: Archivist Karen Possner announced that the DC Carnegie Library, home to the DC Historical Society where our archives have been stored, is closing. The Historical Society has moved to the Newseum and is accessible by a separate entrance (sans fee.) Call ahead if you wish to visit the Sycamore Island archives. The Historical Society will move back into the Carnegie Library after its renovation...hopefully, towards the end of December 2018.

**Club Supervisor's Report:** Club Supervisor Marianne Ross wished to buy a new whistling tea kettle for the club house. It was explained that such items can be purchased from the Glen Echo hardware store where the Club has an account. Marianne should call Treasurer Ned Goddard and have her name added to the list of persons approved to make purchases. Someone suggested posting a list of needed items in the Islander before purchasing them. Members

might be happy to donate items.

There was a discussion about the "shabbiness" of the Club. Karen Possner suggested changing some of the light fixtures and acquiring new moisture resistant furniture, such as treated wicker with cushions covered in "outdoor materials." She warned against acquiring upholstered chairs or couches, noting that insects dwelled therein.

Drew Walsh has been given chairs and suggested rewarding the donor with a day pass to the island. This action was approved. There followed a lengthy discussion about the "day pass," and to whom it can be given. There will be further review about day pass policy after conferring with Ann Marie Cunningham re: the original intent of the pass.

**Caretaker's Report:** Caretaker Joe Hage remarked on the large turnout for the Regatta. He is optimistic about having a big turnout for the Fall Work Fest, as attendance is now tied to a member's eligibility to host a big party.

Fall Work Fest: Sunday, Nov. 12th Raindate: Sunday, Nov. 19th

Gerry Barton noted that Joe has created a new and charming overlook on the south side of the Island. He has mowed the ground cover, set up chairs, and even put up a small tent.

**New Business:** David Winer made the following proposal: Permanent signs to be placed on club property must be approved by vote of the membership in a regular club meeting. The proposal was passed 16 to 1.
